



WELCOME TO THEATRE CALGARY



have profound faith in stories like *Forgiveness* that we tell on and off our stages. As we confront the ever-changing social, political, and physical landscape of the world, I see the potential for change — effective change — coming from the simple act of sharing a powerful story on a stage. *Forgiveness* looks at the past through the present and reveals a world teetering on the edge of an abyss. Why do we so enjoy looking back into our collective past? There is a simple answer to this inquiry – we study our past because we can view history from a safe distance. The facts a person researches about a certain topic, like World War II or the internment might anger and hurt some people, but there is nothing that person can do about it – because it is in the past. In other words, history cannot directly harm us since

it is not at arm's length. However, what we're discovering today is that the past is repeating itself. And so, we can learn from our past. As a director, to collaborate with a team of artists in translating the powerful words, images, and history of the characters within Forgiveness is a true gift. This gift is very personal to me as there are direct historical connections that involved my family - my father's family (the Arimas) were interned in British Columbia, and my uncle (Bruce Colette McDonald) served in the Royal Canadian Air Force as Leading Aircraftsman for three years. Their collective and individual lives were ultimately touched by the events of World War II. What makes directing this play such a miracle is that the adaptation has found a unique voice thorough the playwright, Hiro Kanagawa. Hiro has imbued Mark Sakamoto's memoir with a heavy dose of theatre poetry to allow these captivating groups of people to live and flourish on a stage. Forgiveness is not only a love-letter to the theatre and the intriguing ways we can tell stories, but it's also a thought-provoking piece that holds a mirror up to the world we live in today and asks important questions (without forcing an answer) about culture, tradition, xenophobia, and belonging. Since the world and how we relate to each other is evolving at a rapid pace, I sometimes find myself caught up in the cyclone of tweets and Google alerts. However, I can always rely on the grounding energy of entering a theatre, sitting in my seat, perusing through the program, and allowing myself to be open to the wonderment and breathtaking power of theatre storytelling. I hope that you find a similar sensations as you experience this performance of Forgiveness.

PLAYWRIGHT'S NOTES



hroughout the rehearsal process and even into the previews of *Forgiveness* in Vancouver earlier this year, the play you are about to see underwent numerous edits, cuts and rewrites on a near-daily basis. For my dramaturg Stephen Drover, the quote: "A play is never finished, merely abandoned," became a kind of mantra.

The quote has various attributions but in the theatrical context, it appears to originate with American director Alan Schneider. In 1962 as he was about to premiere *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* on Broadway, Schneider remarked to a journalist, "I don't know of any perfect play. A work of art is

never completed, only abandoned. The only perfect play is a dead play."

I have never felt this more keenly than with *Forgiveness*. The story began, after all, as the lived experience of Mark Sakamoto's grandparents, Ralph MacLean and Mitsue Sakamoto. As a work of literary art, *Forgiveness* was then an essay Mark wrote for the *Globe and Mail*. He expanded it into a beloved and award-winning book which was then adapted by me for the stage and magnificently realized in this production directed by Stafford Arima. The play has enjoyed a tremendously successful run in Vancouver, but even as the show opened Stafford and I knew that there were changes we wanted to make for Calgary, changes we simply ran out of rehearsal time to implement. The great gift of this co-production between the Arts Club and Theatre Calgary and the "rolling premiere" the show has been accorded is that we now have an opportunity to incorporate everything we learned at the Stanley in Vancouver into our run here at the Max Bell.

None of this could have happened, of course, without a director, a cast and crew, and a design team willing and able to roll with the punches. It is a testament to their artistry, commitment and fearlessness that *Forgiveness* remains a living, evolving work of art. And now you, the Calgary audience, will play a large role in how this play continues to grow.

The phrase "it takes a village" comes to mind as I reflect on how the play Forgiveness was created. I am forever grateful to Ralph MacLean and Mitsue Sakamoto who lived this story, to Mark Sakamoto who shared their experiences with the world, and to his extended family who trusted me and embraced me as one of their own. The work of creating a production of this scale and ambition could then not have been done without the generous and steadfast support of virtually every resource available in the Canadian theatre ecology. From the word go, both the Arts Club and Theatre Calgary were unwavering in their belief that this play would be produced. The Banff Playwrights' Lab provided the time, space, and resources for me to complete the first draft. And an immensely important grant from the National Creation Fund allowed the design team to integrate animation by Cindy Mochizuki into the overall concept.

Forgiveness remains, thankfully, imperfect, not dead. To experience it, I hope, is to experience something organic. I know I speak for all involved when I say that we are thrilled to now welcome you, the Calgary audience, on the next leg of this show's evolution.

HISTORICAL FACTS

Acts of Injustice

rom the time the first recorded Japanese immigrants began to arrive in Canada in the late 1800s, Japanese Canadians faced racial discrimination. They were not allowed to vote and were barred from many jobs. As seen in Forgiveness, discrimination worsened when Canada declared war on Japan in 1941. Even though most Japanese Canadians were born in Canada or had become naturalized citizens. Canada ordered their mass incarceration and the appropriation of their property. The government ignored the RCMP and military leaders, who stated that Japanese Canadians were not a threat to Canada's security.

Hastings Park

n early 1942, the Pacific National Exhibition (PNE) grounds at Hastings Park in East Vancouver were used to temporarily house Japanese Canadians like Mitsue and her family, who were being uprooted from the BC Coast, Over 8,000 were detained in the buildings and stables there before being sent to internment sites in the BC interior or work camps across the country. For many Japanese Canadians, living in Hastings Park was a terrible, fearful experience. Conditions were extremely primitive and unsanitary. The primary memory for many Japanese Canadians interned at Hastings Park was the horrible smell, followed by the noise. the boredom, and the terrible food.

Life in the Internment Era (1942-1949)

Japanese Canadians built communities in harsh and isolated conditions. In internment camps, they lived in small, quickly built shacks with no insulation, running water, or electricity. Men were separated from their families, who often didn't know where their relatives were sent for months.

On sugar beet farms, everyone old enough to work spent long hours in the fields

Even while imprisoned, Japanese Canadians tried to make their new communities better by setting up schools, churches,

Legacies

he struggle for redress took many years. Particularly through the 1980s, Japanese Canadians worked hard to educate all Canadians about the internment. Many asked, "Could anything truly make up for all we had lost and endured?"

The 1988 redress settlement was negotiated between the National Association of Japanese Canadians and the federal government. In 2012, MLA Naomi Yamamoto, the first Japanese Canadian elected to the Legislative Assembly, led

a Motion of Apology to the Japanese Canadians in the BC Legislature. This began a process that resulted in Premier John Horgan's announcement of a provincial redress settlement in May 2022 to acknowledge the BC provincial government's role in Japanese Canadian internment.

and activities. Young adults volunteered to teach school and coach baseball teams.

In 2015, four commemorative plaques were unveiled at sites around Hastings Park. The Japanese Canadian Hastings Park Interpretive Centre Society is currently developing plans for an onsite exhibit to commemorate this history and the people incarcerated there.

The 1988 parliamentary redress settlement included the following:

- An acknowledgment that Canada had violated Japanese Canadians' human rights.
- Individual payments of \$21,000 to survivors of these violations.
- The establishment of a Japanese Canadian community fund of \$12 million.
- The clearing of criminal records for those charged under the War Measures Act.
- Restoration of Canadian citizenship to those exiled to Japan.
- The creation of the Canadian Race Relations Foundation to help eliminate racism.

HISTORICAL BIOS

MITSUE SAKAMOTO

After the war, Mitsue never lived in BC again. She lived in the same house in Medicine Hat for 67 years, and in her modest kitchen she fed many of the musicians that her son, Ron, promoted over the years, including The Guess Who, Murray MacLachlan, Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Bruce Cockburn, and many others. She passed away in 2014, at the age of 93.

RALPH MACLEAN

Ralph settled in Calgary after the war, worked for Cominco for 40 years, and lived there for the rest of his life. A decorated war veteran, he received the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2012. At the time of his death in March 2020, at the age of 97, he was one of the last surviving members among the Canadian soldiers who fought in Hong Kong. Though he lost his eyesight due to his wartime illnesses, he remained as vibrant and lucid as ever until the end.

STAN SAKAMOTO

An entrepreneur and lifelong community leader in Medicine Hat, Stan is a past director of the Medicine Hat Rotary Club and a former trustee of the Medicine Hat Museum and Art Gallery. In 2016, he ran for the federal Liberals in the riding of Medicine Hat-Cardston-Warner; while he was not victorious, he gained more votes in that riding than any other Liberal candidate in history.

DIANE MACLEAN


Diane married Stan Sakamoto in 1973. Their sons, Mark and Daniel, were born in 1977 and 1980. After Diane and Stan divorced in 1985, Diane fell into alcoholism and substance abuse and spent the last years of her life in Medicine Hat's Cecil Hotel. She passed away in 2001, at the age of 53.

RON SAKAMOTO

A legend in the country music industry, Ron was instrumental in launching the careers of Jerry Reed, Keith Urban, Shania Twain, and countless other stars. After Ron received the Canadian Country Music Association Promoter of the Year Award for 17 consecutive years, the award was named after him. He was inducted into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame in 2014.


CAMP COMMANDANT TETSUTARO KATO

Kato was sentenced to death for war crimes, but his influential family was able to have his sentence commuted. He was released for good behaviour in 1952. He went on to write the war crimes apologia *I Want to Be a Shellfish*. The novel has spawned three film adaptations, most notably by Shinobu Hashimoto, writer of the Kurosawa classics *Rashomon, Ikiru*, and *Seven Samurai*.



MACLEAN AND SAKAMOTO IMPORTANT DATES

- June 10, 1920 Mitsue Oseki is born in Eburne, BC.
- June 27, 1922 Ralph MacLean is born in Grindstone, Quebec.
- December, 1941 During the Second World War, Canadian soldiers first fought defending the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong against a Japanese attack. With minimal military training, the Canadian soldiers fought in Hong Kong against overwhelming odds, with very little chance of success. Eventually surrendering to the enemy after being overtaken, the surviving soldiers became Japanese prisoners of war (Ralph is captured on Christmas Day, 1941). From this point forward, they would experience starvation, torture, and inhumane living conditions for four years.



- 1942 Mitsue marries Hideo Sakamoto shortly before their family is uprooted and sent to Coaldale, AB, during Japanese evacuation of Vancouver. They are housed in a farmer's chicken coop and made to do stoop labour on the land.
- 1945 After the prisoner of war camps are liberated, Ralph returns to Canada. While transporting back to Quebec from Vancouver, a stop in Calgary leads Ralph to meet Phyllis, whom he falls in love with and marries. The couple settle in Calgary, and the give birth to a daughter, Diane, in 1951.
- 1967 Diane MacLean meets Stan Sakamoto. Stan, born in 1950, is the son of Mitsue and Hideo Sakamoto.

"Mitsue and Ralph became instant friends. There was an unspoken understanding between them. They were both far too polite to state it, to address it. But they felt they knew each other. Deep down, they knew each other. They had both discarded the past, keeping only what they needed, leaving the rest behind. They did not compare hardships or measure injustices. They knew there was no merit to that."

- 1968 The MacLean and Sakamoto families meet for dinner, and become friends.
- December 29, 1973 Diane and Stan are married.
- July 4, 1977 Mark Sakamoto, son of Diane and Stan, is born in Medicine Hat, AB. Brother Daniel is born in 1980.
- September 10, 2013 Mitsue Sakamoto passes away at the age of 93 years, in Medicine Hat.
- 2014 Mark's novel Forgiveness: A Gift from My Grandparents is published by Harper Collins.
- 2018 Forgiveness wins CBC's Canada Reads book competition.






